Scope and Content Note: This collection, which dates from 1740-2004, includes dozens of hand drawn maps, and maps with engravings, most of them originals, as well as bound atlases, representing the City of Hudson and its immediate surrounding area, including Columbia County and portions of adjacent counties as well as New York State. These items contain important information about the history of Hudson and the surrounding region – from insurance and railroad maps, topographical and geological maps, to bird's eye view drawings and developmental proposals. The collection also includes maps that provide information about The Hudson River as a site of commerce, industry, travel, and tourism, as well as wildlife and residential life, since the settling of the city of Hudson. The collection features maps and bound atlases from a multitude of important historic publishers, including Beers, Ellis & Co.; H.H. Rowley & Co; F.W. Beers; Hudson River Sloop Clearwater; The Sanborn Map Company; and Frank E. Richards, among others.

This collection is a valuable resource for researchers, residents, local homeowners, and elected officials. It is also a valuable resource for educators, as maps can function as a tool to teach primary source literacy skills.

The vast majority of the collection is in fair or good condition and may be viewed or handled with appropriate precautions. Digital images and scans of some of these maps are available.

It includes hand drawn and engraved maps, most of them originals, which contain important information about the history of Hudson, Hudson residents, and the surrounding region, as well as providing information about the Hudson River as a site of commerce, travel, wildlife, and residential life throughout history.
